# College Hill woman to receive cleanup award

## Good Things Happening

Phyllis Schoenberger of College Hill will receive the Great American Cleanup Hometown Hero Award at 9 a.m. Saturday during the Great American Cleanup showcase event at 800 Hamilton Ave., College Hill.

The award will be presented by Keep Cincinnati Beautiful, a nonprofit organization that promotes litter prevention, recycling and community improvement.

Schoenberger is founder of the College Hill Gardeners, Community Problem Oriented Policing and College Hill Summit, which includes community leaders who meet once a month.

She also chairs the Quality of Life Committee, which prepares "Dear Neighbor" letters, spreads information about housing code enforcement and addresses litter problems.

Schoenberger and her husband, Mark, adopted a vacant lot at Llanfair and Hamilton avenues. They designed a garden bed beneath the community sign, planted flowers and ornamental grasses.

The College Hill Farm Market is open in the area each Tuesday. It was also the site of the first community fall festival.

### Hotel welcomes pupils

Fifteen fifth-graders from St. Joseph School, 745 Ezzard Charles Drive, West End, had a chance to see what their corporate partner does for a living.
